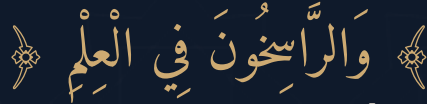

FOUNDATIONS FIRST. FIRMLY ROOTED.

Most of us finished madrasah at thirteen able to read the Qur'an, and then stopped. The years that follow – sixth form, university, work, family – are the years in which a Muslim decides who they are, and they are the years we are given the least.

at-Ta'sīl – the Foundation Diploma in Islamic Studies – is the next step: for sixth-formers, university students, working professionals and anyone sixteen or over who wants to study properly. A cohort of brothers and sisters studies the foundational texts of the Madinah curriculum three evenings a week for a full academic year, learns Arabic from the Islamic University of Madinah's own coursebook to a defined level, and carries real responsibility in the masjid from the first week.

The name is honest about the level. Ta'sīl is what the scholars call this stage: laying the foundations – the short, sound texts on which everything else is built. The goal is what the Qur'an calls ar-rāsikhūn fil-'ilm, those firmly rooted in knowledge; a Muslim who has memorised al-Uṣūl ath-Thalāthah with its proofs, who prays exactly as the ḥadīth describe and knows which ḥadīth each action rests on, is not easily moved – not by doubt, not by extremes, not by the noise on a phone.

And it is a real diploma-sized year, designed to UK higher-study conventions: taught sessions, directed daily study, weekly written work, termly essays and formal examinations – some 380-400 hours of study in all. Every text begun is finished, every skill examined; nothing waits for a second year.

A WORD FROM THE TEACHER

I have spent more than ten years in educational leadership, more than eight of them as a head teacher, and over a decade as an imam. I hold ijāzāt from mashāyikh in different parts of the world, including Madinah. What I bring to this programme is the two together: the texts, read the way they were read to me, and the experience of what actually works with teenagers and young adults. The same gap appears every year – a capable young Muslim, at sixth form, at university or in a first job, with nowhere serious to go next. This programme is what I would want for my own children. Bring us a young person who can read the Qur'an and is willing to work. We will do the rest together.

The Forty Ḥadīth memorised in full in the weekly tasmī' slot – two or three a week with a one-line meaning, all forty-two by July – and the aḥādīth of purification and prayer met as evidences in the fiqh strand.

Every core text is a matn you can carry in memory for life.

EVERY POINT WITH ITS PROOF

Belief and ruling are learned with the āyah or ḥadīth behind them – the habit the texts themselves teach.

SOMETHING REAL TO CARRY

A rota, a talk, a service log, an event: responsibility from week one, not a certificate at the end.

THE BOOKSHELF OF A FIRST-YEAR STUDENT IN MADINAH

Every core text below is a recognised matn of the Salafi curriculum, chosen because it is short, sound and provable, and because it can be carried in memory for life; the supporting texts are its standard commentaries and readers. Where each sits in the Madinah tradition is noted so that you can see what you are joining.

Core matn – memorised

At Madinah • Taught alongside al-Uṣūl ath-Thalāthah as the second of the author's short creed texts.

Shaykh Muḥammad ibn ‘Abd al-Wahhāb

Core matn – memorised

At Madinah • The third of the short creed texts; completes the beginner's set.

A panel of scholars – King Fahd Complex for the Printing of the Holy Qur'an, Madinah (1424H)

The spine – Book of Purification and Book of Prayer complete (including Funerals), the essentials of Fasting; every ruling with its evidence

At Madinah • Published by the King Fahd Complex in Madinah under the Ministry of Islamic Affairs: a clear, comprehensive fiqh of worship and transactions that also flags the common errors people fall into, each ruling with its evidence from the Qur'an and the authentic Sunnah.

al-Arba’ūn an-Nawawiyyah

Imām Yaḥyā ibn Sharaf an-Nawawī (d. 676H)

Memorised in full through the weekly tasmi’ slot, with a one-line meaning of each

At Madinah • Memorised early in the Madinah ladder, in the preparatory institutes.

Core text – al-Fātiḥah and all of Juz’ ‘Ammā

At Madinah • The foremost tafsīr by transmission – the Qur'an explained by the Qur'an, the Sunnah and the Salaf – standard in Madinah's institutes; the abridgement keeps the ma’tḥūr core within reach of a first-year student.

Arabic Course for English-Speaking Students, Book 1

Dr V. Abdur Rahim, Islamic University of Madinah

Core coursebook – completed in 24 sessions

At Madinah • Written for the University's Arabic Language Institute by its long-serving professor of Arabic, and taught there for decades.

Introduction – kalām, the parts of speech, i’rāb and its signs, the marfū’āt (6 sessions)

INSIDE THE HOUR

0-5 min	The Rā'ī of the Week opens: adhkār, register, timekeeping

50-60	Questions, consolidation, the week's memorisation set
Term 3, Wed	The hour opens with the students' khāṭirahs; tasmī' runs 10-18, the text from 18

AT HOME

45-60 minutes of directed study a day – the matn being memorised, the Arabic exercises and the weekly written task – a structured essay once a term. Parents of under-18s receive a one-page record each term showing what has been memorised and heard.

Dates follow Leicester City Council's school calendar for holidays; the programme runs a fortnight past the schools' summer close so that the examinations and the capstone fall in the last two weeks. Īd dates are confirmed by moon-sighting; the Ramaḍān Circle's day and time are announced in January so that they do not clash with tarāwīḥ. Full session-by-session detail is in the syllabus.

SIX LABS, AND A YEAR OF CARRYING REAL WEIGHT

In Islam leadership is a trust before it is a position. *“Every one of you is a shepherd, and every one of you is responsible for his flock.”* The programme teaches it the way the Prophet ﷺ taught his young companions: by giving them something real to carry.

01 Amānah – leadership is responsibility; the etiquette of the seeker

‘Every one of you is a shepherd...’ (Bukhārī and Muslim); what leadership means in Islam and what it does not; Ḥilyat Ṭālib al-‘Ilm on ādāb with oneself, the teacher and companions; the Rā’ of the Week rota begins; each student writes a personal ‘ahd

Three sīrah case studies from ar-Raḥīq al-Makhtūm: shūrā at the Trench, patience at Ḥudaybiyah, mercy at the Conquest of Makkah

Muṣ‘ab ibn ‘Umayr the ambassador; Usāmah ibn Zayd the commander; Ibn ‘Abbās and Zayd ibn Thābit the scholars; ‘Ā’ishah the teacher of the Ummah; a personal Ramaḍān leadership plan

04 Speaking with knowledge – the khāṭirah workshop

Building a five-minute talk: āyah, ḥadīth, one point, one action; delivery; the adab of speech. Every student delivers one in Term 3, one, two or three a Wednesday as numbers require

Imāmah and adhān in practice; leading adhkār; running a ḥalaqah; the capstone evening is planned – teams, roles, timeline, budget, risk

06 Character under pressure; capstone rehearsal

Anger, patience, honesty, friendship, the phone in your hand – from Riyāḍ aṣ-Ṣāliḥīn; da‘wah with wisdom (an-Naḥl 16:125); the capstone evening rehearsed

EVERY WEEK, NOT JUST LAB WEEKS

Rā’ of the Week

One or two students carry the week: register, opening adhkār, timekeeping, the room left tidy, newcomers welcomed. Everyone leads at least once in the year.

The khāṭirah

From Term 3 every Wednesday session opens with students' five-minute talks with evidences – one, two or three a week as numbers require – prepared in Lab 4 and assessed.

The khidmah log

Ten hours of recorded service to the masjid across the year, signed off by the masjid.

The matn tracker

A personal record of every text memorised and heard by the teacher: al-Uṣūl ath-Thalāthah, al-Qawā’id al-Arba’, Nawāqid al-Islām, and the Forty – two or three of which are set each week and heard in the tasmī slot, so that all forty-two are memorised by July.

Peer teaching

Each student re-teaches one Arabic point to the class; teaching is the fastest way to learn and the surest test of understanding.

The capstone

In the closing week the cohort plans and runs a community evening at Masjid Fida: recitation, khāṭirahs, a quiz for younger children, hospitality. Roles are real and the teacher steps back.

BY JULY 2027

‘AQĪDAH

Recite al-Uṣūl ath-Thalāthah, al-Qawā'id al-Arba' and Nawāqid al-Islām from memory and explain each point with its evidence from the Qur'an and Sunnah.

FIQH

Perform purification and prayer as the evidences describe, give the evidence for each ruling, call the adhān, lead a prayer and lead the funeral prayer.

TAFSĪR

Explain the meaning and lessons of al-Fātiḥah and every sūrah of Juz' 'Ammah, and pray with understanding.

ḤADĪTH

Recite the Forty Ḥadīth in Arabic, say where each is found, and explain what it proves.

ARABIC

Reach Arabic Level 1 (Foundation): read and write voweled Arabic, form and parse basic nominal and verbal sentences, and translate a short sūrah or ḥadīth with a dictionary.

LEADERSHIP & RESPONSIBILITY

Deliver a five-minute khātirah with evidences, lead adhkār and prayer, and plan and run a community event as a team.

ARABIC LEVEL 1 • FOUNDATION

A defined, examined level so that a graduate knows exactly what they can do in Arabic – and so does anyone who reads the certificate.

- Read any voweled Arabic text accurately and write it from dictation
- Form and understand the nominal sentence (mubtada' and khabar), the iḍāfah, the adjective phrase and the prepositional phrase
- Use the demonstratives, the detached and attached pronouns, and gender agreement
- Recognise and form the sound and broken plurals and the dual, and count from one to twenty
- Use the past-tense verb with its subject pronouns and build the verbal sentence
- Name the parts of speech and the signs of raf', naṣb, jarr and jazm, and parse a simple sentence – the opening of al-Ājurrūmiyyah
- Command a core vocabulary of about five hundred words, including two hundred from Juz' 'Ammah and the ḥadīth studied
- Translate a short sūrah or a ḥadīth of the Forty with a dictionary, and hold a two-minute basic conversation

THE AWARD

The Foundation Diploma. Awarded by the International Islamic College at Pass, Merit or Distinction, naming the texts completed and the Arabic level achieved. Awarded to students who sit and pass the end-of-year examinations (entry fee £50, optional); a student who does not enter receives a transcript of the year's study instead.

Ḥāfiẓ al-Mutūn endorsement. For students who recite the three creed texts and the Forty Ḥadīth in full.

A year that stands alone. Every text begun this year is finished this year. Nothing in the programme depends on a second year; a graduate leaves with the skills below and the tools to read further texts with a teacher.

Distinction 80% and above, Merit 65%, Pass 50%, with the memorisation component passed in every case.

A DIPLOMA-SIZED YEAR, BY THE BOOK

UK courses are measured in notional learning hours – everything the course asks of a student, not just time in class – at ten hours to one credit. The Foundation Diploma is designed, sized and assessed to those conventions.

The Foundation Diploma is the College's own award. It is benchmarked to these national conventions in volume, workload and assessment; the College is independent, so the award itself is not a regulated qualification and carries no university credit. Points of reference: the QAA Framework for Higher Education Qualifications; the QAA subject benchmark statement for Theology and Religious Studies; the Regulated Qualifications Framework sizing conventions.

DIPLOMA-SIZED

UK convention reserves the title Diploma for courses of 37 credits (370 hours) or more. This programme is designed above that threshold – nearly double a typical evening course.

WRITTEN TO FHEQ CONVENTIONS

Learning outcomes in the four FHEQ domains, marked written work with feedback, structured essays, formal examinations and defined grade descriptors – the design conventions of the UK Framework for Higher Education Qualifications.

FOUNDATION STAGE

Pitched at the foundation stage of higher study – the bridge from Level 3 into Level 4, as in a university foundation year: taught texts and defined outcomes, with analytical writing built up term by term.

WHAT THAT LOOKS LIKE EACH WEEK

Three taught hours, Monday to Wednesday 8-9pm. Forty-five minutes to an hour of directed study a day. One short written assignment a week and a structured essay each term, marked with feedback. Termly examinations, and the Arabic Level 1 written and oral finals in July.

THE GRADUATE

WHAT A GRADUATE OF THE DIPLOMA CAN DO

- ◇ Recite al-Uṣūl ath-Thalāthah, al-Qawā'id al-Arba' and Nawāqid al-Islām from memory and explain every point with its proof.
- ◇ Perform purification and prayer as the evidences describe, and give the evidence from the Qur'an and Sunnah for each ruling.
- ◇ Call the adhān, lead a prayer, lead the funeral prayer, and lead the adhkār after ṣalāh.
- ◇ Recite the Forty Ḥadīth in Arabic, say where each is found, and explain what each proves.
- ◇ Explain al-Fātiḥah and every sūrah of Juz' 'Ammā, and pray with understanding.
- ◇ Read, write and parse basic classical Arabic at Level 1 (Foundation), with a core vocabulary of about five hundred words.
- ◇ Deliver a five-minute talk with evidences, plan and run a community event, and keep a record of service.
- ◇ Summarise a text or a ruling clearly in writing, with its evidence.
- ◇ Know the limit of a student: ask a scholar, never issue a verdict.

WHO IT IS FOR

OPEN TO BROTHERS AND SISTERS

- ◇ Aged 16 or over on 1 September 2026 – sixth-formers, university students and working professionals alike; no upper age limit.
- ◇ Able to read the Qur'an fluently in Arabic script – the Arabic strand moves at the Madinah pace.
- ◇ Three hours in class each week – Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, 8.00–9.00pm – with 45–60 minutes of directed study a day, one short written assignment a week and a structured essay each term.
- ◇ Attendance of 90% or better; parents of under-18s are told of every absence.
- ◇ The ādāb of the ḥalaqah: phones away, teacher and companions honoured, the room left better than it was found.
- ◇ Parental consent for students under 18.

FEES

£40 a month for eleven months (September to July): £440 for the year. The end-of-year examination fee is £50 – the examination is optional, but the Diploma is awarded only to students who sit and pass it. £490 for the year including the Diploma examination, plus the class book bundle at cost.

CERTIFICATE

Students who complete the programme are awarded the Foundation Diploma in Islamic Studies by the International Islamic College.

SAFEGUARDING

Parents of under-18s receive the programme's safeguarding statement and the named lead's contact details before the first session. Every session is held on masjid premises; seating and delivery arrangements follow the masjid's practice, and the sessions on personal fiqh are taught separately.

MASJID FIDA

Al-Furqan Islamic Da'wah Association – teaching the Qur'an and Sunnah in Leicester since 2005, in its own masjid since 2011: daily and Jumu'ah prayers, a boys' and girls' madrasah, adult classes and da'wah.

INTERNATIONAL ISLAMIC COLLEGE
